We watched the kick-off of our new Fundraising Team, headed by our Emeritus member Bill Mixon. They have already come up with a great track plan that will become obvious very soon, starting with a new twist on our old "Twelve Trains of Christmas" raffle of years ago. Bill will be putting out the details real soon, and raffle tickets will go on sale at our Spring Fling Train Show on May 7th.

Speaking of the Train Show, our vendors tables are sold out once again, and we expect a great show as there are so few opportunities to shop for trains here on the Eastern Shore these days. We have 70 tables to set up, and the O gauge modular display to set up and operate.

Our workshop hosted at the Selbyville Library is going well, we have 5 youngsters involved and they are very enthusiastic. The theme will be "interesting" as we wait to see how they execute on their vision of a Theme Park with two major "Worlds" on open spaces afforded by a Figure 8 track plan,, surrounded by Ocean and with seashore beaches edging the sides of the rail line.

We have two recently completed train layouts for sale for this show. A great looking HO display that uses a figure eight over/under "double track" plan and sidings, and plenty of detail to enjoy. The O Gauge offering this a basic oval with passing siding using traditional tubular track, from a recently donated layout and with some easy-to run Lionel rolling stock. Both are mounted on 4 x 8 ft tables, and are turn-key ready to run with trains provided.

The saga of my 72-year old train table, by Steve Callahan

In the early 1950s the Callanen family lived in an old farm house on Cream Street in Hyde Park, NY. My mechanical engineer father, Oliver E. Callanen, constructed a 4-ft. by 8-ft. train table, covered with green roofing paper, on which a simple O-27 layout was configured using two pairs of Lionel switches.

The table was located in a small room on the back side of the house adjacent to the family dining room. Not surprising, my smart Mom soon identified a much better use for this valuable first floor area. Therefore, Dad moved the train table into the basement and extended it with an old door at the end of the original table, as shown in the following photo of 13-year old me running trains in 1954.
